- Ensuring availability of low-cost generic medicines and diagnostic facilities in tier-2 and tier-3 cities was discussed.

- Healthcare leaders: Urged stronger adoption of digital platforms for record-keeping and patient follow-up.
- Policy experts: Suggested incentives for startups and MedTech innovators working on low-cost healthcare solutions.
- Academicians: Called for more interdisciplinary training that combines management, technology, and medicine.
