WHO Launches Global Patient Safety Campaign for Newborns & Children

Occasion: World Patient Safety Day 2025

Background

- World Health Organization (WHO), along with global health partners, launched a new initiative on the eve of *World Patient Safety Day* 2025.
- The campaign is titled: "Patient Safety from the Start: Ensure Safe Care for Every Newborn and Every Child."
- Focus is on improving the quality of healthcare and preventing avoidable harm in neonatal and pediatric services.

® Key Objectives of the Campaign

1. Prevent Avoidable Harm

 Address common causes of harm in hospitals such as medical errors, healthcare-associated infections, unsafe blood transfusions, and delays in diagnosis or surgery.

2. Promote Standardized Protocols

- Encourage hospitals to adopt global safety protocols tailored for newborns and children.
- 3. Strengthen Health Systems

 Build resilient pediatric and maternal care services with trained staff, adequate equipment, and safe infrastructure.

4. Raise Awareness

- Highlight the unique vulnerabilities of children and newborns to medical errors.
- Educate healthcare professionals, parents, and caregivers about safety practices.

Why It Matters (Data & Context)

- Globally, 1 in 10 patients is harmed while receiving hospital care; children and newborns are at even higher risk.
- In low- and middle-income countries, unsafe care is estimated to contribute to up to 2.6 million deaths annually.
- Leading causes of avoidable harm in children include:
 - Delayed treatment for infections.
 - Medication errors.
 - Unsafe blood transfusions.
 - Errors in surgical and anesthesia procedures.

🏥 Relevance to India

- India accounts for a large share of global neonatal mortality.
- Recent studies highlight that over 50% of neonatal deaths in India are preventable with timely and safe interventions.

- The WHO campaign aligns with India's ongoing programs such as:
 - LaQshya (Labour Room Quality Improvement Initiative).
 - Janani Suraksha Yojana (JSY) for safe motherhood.
 - Special Newborn Care Units (SNCUs) across states.



Expert Voices

- Dr. Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus (WHO Director-General): "Every child deserves safe care from their very first breath. This campaign is about protecting the most vulnerable and ensuring safety becomes a non-negotiable part of healthcare."
- Indian Pediatric Association Representative: Emphasized the need for strengthening pediatric ICUs, digital monitoring of drug dosing, and family-centered safety practices.



Expected Impact

- Improved adherence to patient safety protocols in neonatal and pediatric units.
- Greater training and accountability among healthcare workers.
- Reduced infant and child mortality linked to unsafe care.
- Increased awareness among caregivers and communities about their rights to safe healthcare.
